The Autism Puzzle Piece Design



The rainbow-colored infinity symbol was added as a symbol for Autism in 2018. It was created to remove the idea that those with autism are missing parts or are incomplete.



Light it Up Blue or Wear Blue originally represented boys with autism. Many people and businesses recognize Autism during the month of April by Light It Up Blue.
